Do you remember the "good news" story from the Morehouse College commencement a few years ago? The commencement speaker, billionaire Robert F. Smith, pledged that his family would pay off the \$40 million student loans of all 396 graduating seniors.

Wouldn't it be amazing if we were able to do something like that? What would it look like if, as a church family, we could help students graduate from college without the burden of overwhelming debt? On November 28, United Methodist Student Day, we have the opportunity to do exactly that.

United Methodist Student Day is one of six Special Sundays when we receive an offering for a particular ministry through the denomination. Your gifts through this offering benefit students as they pursue opportunities in higher education. Your contribution will be joined with those of millions of other United Methodists to provide scholarships to deserving recipients. In 2020, United Methodist Student Day received \$236,828.00. These generous donations provided scholarships to many United Methodist students to further their education and enrich the life of the Church.

Student Day was first celebrated in 1940 when a college education could be attained for \$450 annually. Today, that same education costs an average of \$23,000 each year.

## Education matters — Please give generously on November 28

The United Methodist Church believes that every person has the right to education and that the responsibility of educating young people rests with the family, faith communities, and the government. On United Methodist Student Day, we have the opportunity to support scholarships and low-interest loans that help young leaders achieve their dreams.

As a child who experienced being bullied, Benjamin Carlson found refuge in his church. As a college student, the Gift of Hope scholarship offset some of his college expenses and he says it "reinforced my understanding that The United Methodist Church supports [its] students."

As a community of faith, let's make this United Methodist Student Day the most successful yet. We have the opportunity to contribute to the development of young people like Morgan and Benjamin. Together, we can help propel the next generation toward success.

They are not always with us in person, but we know that we are still connected as the body of Christ. ## VOLUNTEER


Another form of Stewardship, is Volunteer Service. There are so many ways you can help your church and your community.

## The Widow's Mite

Jesus was at the temple ... as he taught, he said, "Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive greater condemnation."

He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

Mark 12:38-44

This scripture warns us not to be haughty and pompous about our gifts to the church. That a gift of love, such as the poor widow gave is indeed valuable in the sight of God.

For many years, the Roselle United Methodist Women have take up a collection of the Least Coin. Each month when we gather for our meetings, we give coins from our purse, or a plastic bag filled with small coins from the bowl or container at home where we empty our coins. Every year these small donations of loose coins usually add up to over \$100.00, sometimes nearly \$200.00. Pennies, nickels and dimes add up fast to become dollars. The amount collected during the year is donated to a charity. Where it is combined with other small donations to make a big difference.

We are in the midst of our Stewardship Drive, and asking our church families to contribute generously to the church. We often talk of Tithing, giving 10% of your income. But we have also cautioned you not to try to start out at 10%, but to calculate a smaller percentage as you work your way up the ladder to a goal of 10%. Start at 1, 2, 3 or 4% and then increase your gift to the church until you are tithing. God has asked for the First Fruits of your Labor, not the scraps.

Remember that Jesus told us to "store up for yourselves treasure in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is your heart will be also. (Matt. 6:20–21).

What does this scripture mean? Jesus was telling his disciples not to mindlessly stockpile material possessions (Matt. 6:19). Worldly goods can easily be lost to thieves and natural forces. Every treasure—here meaning money and objects—that can be stockpiled on earth is temporary. Having it comes with no guarantee of keeping it; it's not eternally reliable.

Now Jesus tells His followers to focus instead on stockpiling treasures in heaven. These rewards are eternal. They cannot be lost to moths, rust, thieves, or anything else. In financial terminology, they are a far better investment. Our hearts and our sincerity towards God matter most of all, so having wealth is not a problem until we start to prioritize it over godliness.

How did Jesus mean for His followers to store up rewards for themselves in heaven? He has spoken a few times in this Sermon on the Mount of acts God will reward. These have included being persecuted for Jesus' sake (Mat. 5:11–12); giving to the needy in secret (Matt. 6:4), praying in secret (Matt. 6:6) and fasting without calling attention to oneself (Matt. 6:18). It short, God rewards His people when they lead lives of sincere devotion and worship to Him.

Sunday, November 14 will be our Commitment Sunday, when we will come forward with our pledge to support the missions and ministries of Roselle UMC. Give as you are able, and faithfully keep your commitment to God and His church. Every gift is valuable in our quest to share and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.
