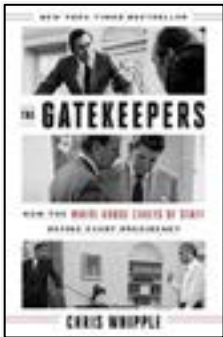

## ***The Gatekeepers***

by Chris Whipple

Peabody and Emmy Award-winning documentary filmmaker Whipple chronicles the roles as well as the successes and failures of White House chiefs of staff from the Richard Nixon to Barack Obama administrations.

The modern White House chief of staff, the gatekeeper to the president and manager of White House operations, emerged during the Nixon administration. While presidents Kennedy and Johnson preferred a more decentralized system with multiple advisers, Nixon's chief, H.R. Halde- man, created a strong, focused organization that has endured for nearly a half-century. The author discusses subsequent administrations and their chiefs in chronological order.

James A. Baker III, Ronald Reagan's first chief of staff, is seen as the gold standard. Also successful were Ger- ald Ford's two chiefs, Donald Rumsfeld and Dick Cheney. Among those whose performance fell short were Hamil- ton Jordan for Jimmy Carter, Donald Regan for Reagan, and Mack McLarty for Bill Clinton. Throughout the book, Whipple identifies several variables that affect perfor- mance: presidential access and support; management style; and whether the chief serves as an honest broker, allowing all arguments on issues to be presented, or as a strict advocate. Also pivotal is whether he—all the chiefs have been men—views himself as a principal, essentially a peer of the president, or as a staff member; invariably, the former is a recipe for failure. An unusual element was added when George W. Bush's vice president, Cheney, ex- perience from White House politics during the Ford ad- ministration, was able to thwart the efforts of Bush's chief, Andrew Card. Whipple also reviews the high and low points of the past eight administrations, and he greatly enhances the narrative with his many interviews, some of which were used for a documentary he did on the subject in 2013

A well-researched, well-written review of a unique govern- ment position—informative for the general public.

Once she settles with her husband on Henley Street in Stratford-upon-Avon she becomes a fiercely protective mother and a steadfast, centrif- ugal force in the life of her young husband, whose career on the London stage is taking off when his beloved young son succumbs to sudden fever.

A luminous portrait of a marriage, a shattering evocation of a family ravaged by grief and loss, and a tender and unforgettable re-imagining of a boy whose life has been all but forgotten, and whose name was given to one of the most celebrated plays of all time, *Hamnet* is mesmerizing, seductive, im- possible to put down—a magnificent leap forward from one of our most gifted novelists.

# Summertime and the Livin' Is Easy

Everyone is familiar with the Ella Fitzgerald hit song, "Summertime and the Livin' Is Easy."

But is it so easy? Our Roselle UMC, like so many other churches has had a rough time going through the Covid-19 Pandemic. And the effects of the Pandemic are still lingering. Because of social distancing, self-quarantining and just downright fear of being in crowded indoor spaces, the pews of our church and churches worldwide were empty.

Yes, we tried to keep up with technology and we had virtual church on Zoom, FaceBook and YouTube. Technology allowed us to worship and pray together. But one thing the technology could not keep up with was the financial support a church needs to continue its work in the congregation, the local community and missions into the world.

Our Roselle UMC, like so many other churches, has fallen behind in our financial gifts. Those gifts pay the salaries of our staff: pastor, musicians, office and custodian. They pay the utilities which continue despite the empty pews. They pay for the repairs to a building that is over 60 years old, we are all aware of the leaky roof.

During the Pandemic, Roselle UMC has received two PPP Loans from the Federal Government, one for \$25,000.00 and the another for \$23,905.00. The first loan for \$25,000.00 has already been forgiven, because the money was used as stipulated by the Federal Government. We are waiting for the second loan to be forgiven, it too, was used in accordance with the stipulations from the Federal Government. Without this nearly \$49,000.00 of Federal Government assistance, Roselle UMC would be in serious financial distress.

In order to keep **Our** Roselle UMC functioning at a sustainable level, we need to consider how each one of us can make financial gifts that will provide the additional funds Roselle UMC needs to continue its ministry. Many of us fell behind on our pledges during the Pandemic, and our doors were closed at Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas—times we can usually count on for extra free-will offerings.

If you are able, catch-up on your pledge; or maybe

you can make an extra gift to the church. It's your Church! The Roselle United Methodist Church.

We all want our church to be there for us at all the special moments in our lives—Baptisms, Confirmations, Weddings, Renewal of Vows. We want to know that we will receive Pastoral care when we need it during illness, hospitalization, counseling service, funerals. We want to be able to be at our church, surrounded by our family and friends at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Church is an important part of our lives.

Roselle UMC finished the fiscal year receiving 93% of the budgeted revenue and spending 97% of the budgeted expenses. The 4% difference between revenue and expenses resulted in a \$9,551.29 loss for the year. Fortunately, the funds from the PPP Loan covered the loss.

## We filled Their Backpacks!

Thanks to the Roselle United Methodist Women, the Roselle United Methodist Church and the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry we were able to purchase the school supplies for 14 students in grades Kindergarten through Fifth Grade.

The families of the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry were grateful to everyone for helping to prepare their young students for the 2021-2022 school year.

The lists of supplies were long, and each grade has a unique list of supplies appropriate for the ages and grade level. But we met the challenge! We collected, sorted, labeled and packed over 1,000 items to distribute to the students. Shoppers brought in bags of crayons, markers, scissors, spiral notebooks, pocket folders, dry erase markers, pencils, pencil sharpeners, and a myriad of other items. One of our women made cloth pencil pouches for each child. We included face masks, large bottles of hand sanitizer, boxes of facial tissue, rolls of paper towels and assorted sizes of self sealing plastic storage bags. Most of the smaller supplies were packed into shoe-box style plastic boxes. In addition, many generous financial donations were received and used to purchase some of the more expensive items like Chromebook covers and Trapper Keepers and items for special-needs students. In all, between cash donations and the value of supplies donated, we distributed almost \$2,000.00 worth of supplies to these families. They were glad to be relieved of this extra financial burden during this time of financial crisis for everyone.

Thank you to each and everyone of you. Your gifts were greatly appreciated and will make a difference in the lives of these young students.

Donations of individual packages of chips, fruit (oranges or bananas) and bottled water. There is a sign-up in the hallway behind the parlor for food donations and/or people willing to serve the food.

The Night Ministry usually has a large turnout of individuals in need of a meal. They anticipate up to 200 people will be served. So if you can donate food items, please be generous.

In the beauty of spring time, the exhausting, oppressive heat of summertime, the welcome cool breezes of fall and during the cold, snow and ice of winter, the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry fulfills the needs of our NEIGHBORS

During the Pandemic, the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry worked extra hard to see that families had enough food. They had 'Pop-Up' Food pantry days, partnering with the Lions Club and other community churches.

### Volunteer Service:

Volunteers are the beating heart of the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry, and as the need to provide more-and-more families with the necessary food items, there is a growing need for volunteers to help with the Food Pantry on Wednesday, Friday or Saturday mornings. There are tasks that need to be done at every level of ability. Many tasks are easy and don't involve heavy lifting.

### Special Need for August

Donations of non-perishable food items, and laundry supplies are always welcome. These items can be placed in the large, white wooden box at the top of the stairs leading to the lower level. Items currently needed include:

- Paper Napkins • Broccoli Cheese Soup • Gravy in cans or jars .
- All flavors of Pie Fillings • All varieties of Dried Beans

Monetary donations go a long way. For every \$1.00 donated to the Roselle UMC Community Food Pantry, we can purchase \$8.00 worth of food at the Northern Illinois Food Bank. # Desperate Need for PADS

Since the Pandemic started in March 2020, approximately 220 PADS clients have been housed in three motels/hotels in the Downers Grove/Naperville area. Financial donations to PADS have been paying for the rooms and food. At this time it is believed that adults and families will stay in these extended stay motels/hotels until October or November. Continued financial support is needed to pay for these accommodations. These facilities are offering shelter to the homeless at a greatly reduced rate. Being sheltered in a safe environment reduces their risk of coming in contact with Covid. Our Roselle UMC members and Roselle UMW have previously donated funds to help support this ministry.

We ask if you are able, please consider a financial gift

to support PADS. You can write a check to Roselle UMC and put PADS on the memo line, or on your giving envelopes, you can put PADS on the 'Other' line and fill in the amount. Financial donations can also be sent directly to PADS.

The motels/hotels, as previously stated, have reduced their rates in order to accommodate the PADS clients. Therefore, they have cut-back on some of the typical amenities you might expect when you stay at a motel/hotel. Clients desperately need toiletry items and foods that are shelf stable. Most of the rooms have access to a microwave and some (not all) have small refrigerators. (Please see the list below.)

PADS is hoping that in mid-October or early November churches will reopen to house adult clients. The groups will be smaller, about 25 adults to a church. Families with younger children will still be provided with accommodations at the motels/hotels, because the younger children are not yet vaccinated. Unfortunately, St. Isidore will not be opening their doors to PADS this fall. This decision will be revisited in the spring. We are waiting to hear from PADS which churches in the area might be hosting the PADS clients.

In November 2020 churches began delivering dinner meals three days a week. On the fourth Thursday ever since November, Roselle UMC has delivered chicken meals and Factor meals to 60-70 clients. We include a piece of fruit and a dessert with each meal. Thanks to Jane and John Walters, Sherrie and Mike Magnini, Randy and Sue Pearson, Barb and Dick McLaughlin, Sue Wadkins and Darold Madigan, and John and Cindy Sheely who have been responsible for delivering the meals to the PADS clients at the Red Roof Inn in Downers Grove. We would like to be able to continue to provide meals for these families at the extended stay hotel.
